What does the National Curriculum say about Music?

'Music is a universal language that embodies one of the highest forms of creativity. A high-quality music education should engage and inspire pupils to develop a love of music and their talent as musicians, and so increase their self-confidence, creativity and sense of achievement. As pupils progress, they should develop a critical engagement with music, allowing them to compose, and to listen with discrimination to the best in the musical canon.'



Our Vision Statement

Through playing, singing, creating and performing, children will develop their confidence, communication, thinking and creative skills and improve their emotional well-being. Music will help to improve pupils' memory and coordination. The skills involved in playing and listening to music will also help learners develop the selfesteem, self-discipline, cooperation and self-motivation necessary for success.

Through our link with Cumbria Music Service, every child will have the opportunity to learn to play a musical instrument before leaving Stramongate and all children in KS2 will be offered further peripatetic lessons in a variety of instruments. Gifted and talented musical pupils are recognised quickly, and they are encouraged to build on their skills.

Singing is highly important part of our day. Weekly assemblies provide the perfect opportunity for whole school singing and children will develop a repertoire of songs. We have a school choir who perform at whole school events as well as outside of school. Additionally, children who play an instrument are also given the opportunity to share their musical skills at different events both in and outside school. It is our aim that each child becomes a confident performer, however we take each child are their own speed and we support children who are less confident and encourage them to flourish.

At Stramongate, it is our vision that we provide every child with a solid foundation in musical skills and that we seek to build every child's love of music through high quality musical experiences, both within and outside of school. We aim for every child to leave Stramongate with an understanding and love of music which they can carry with them for the rest of their lives.

The subject map below shows how our school has interpreted this content. We have chosen to teach music discretely and through a cross curricular approach throughout the whole academic year.

Reception and Key Stage One (Y1/2)

Due to changes to our class structure in Reception, Year 1 and Year 2 from September 2023, we are temporarily using a mixture of Charanga and Kapow to ensure curriculum coverage without repetition. The units selected each half term will be chosen to best meet the needs of that particular cohort and as this is changing each academic year, the following information shows the key skills as opposed to the individual Charanga/Kapow units. The Reception and Year 2-only classes will continue with the Reception and Y2 Charanga schemes but the other 2 mixed-age classes will teach either Charanga or Kapow at Year 1 or 2, depending on the needs of the particular cohort. Year 2 are also taught a Charanga recorders unit in the Spring Term.

Reception key learning:

- Develop a love of nursery rhymes and songs.
- Learn songs and sing in a group or on their own with increasingly-matched pitch.
- Talk about music
- Create movements, moving in time with music.
- Work in small groups, sharing ideas and resources.
- Use claves (Autumn Term) plus triangles and drums (Spring Term) and tuned percussion/glockenspiels (Summer Term)

Years 1 and 2 key learning:

- Explore the use of voice using singing and chanting, beginning to create different sounds (high and low) and singing with expression and confidence.
- Make a sequence of long and short sounds with help, clap longer rhythms. Make sounds that are very different (loud and quiet, high and low etc.)
- Choose sounds to represent different things (ideas, thoughts, feelings, moods etc.)
 Listen to different moods in music.
- Repeat and investigate simple beats and rhythms and beginning to play sounds linking to simple symbols.
- Sing songs, following the tune (melody) well and make and control long and short sounds using voices.
- Perform with others, taking instructions from the leader.
- Listen carefully and recall short rhythmic and melodic patterns.
- Use knowledge of dynamics, timbre and pitch to organise music. Know how sounds can be made and changed to suit a situation.

All Year 2 children get the opportunity to learn to play the recorders during the Spring term, using Charanga's online Music World to support their understanding. Children learn to explore the following areas:

- Choose sounds to achieve an effect and order these to help create an effect.
- Create short musical patterns and sequences of long and short sounds.
- Show control when playing musical instruments so that they sound as they should.
- Use changes in pitch to communicate an idea.
- Identify the beat in music and recognise changes in timbre, dynamics and pitch.

Other musical opportunities:

- KS1 Thursday assembly focuses on singing seasonal based songs.
- Classes take part in a Christmas performance, learning and performing a wide variety of nativity songs.
 - Classes take part in a class assembly where children learn songs to perform to the school and parents.
 - Children visit St George's Church to perform nativity songs.

	Singing - Sing songs from memory with accurate pitch and in tune. Understand the importance of pronouncing the words in a song well and control the voice when singing. Play notes on instruments with care so that they sound clear and begin to follow symbols or notation for rhythm and pitch. Create and develop musical ideas - Compose and perform melodies and songs and recognise and create repeated patterns with a range of instruments. Carefully choose, order, combine and control sounds with awareness of their combined effect. Listening - Describe music using words such as duration, timbre, pitch beat, tempo, and texture. Recognise simple structures, differences in rhythm and pulse and demonstrate this using clapping, singing and playing. Respond and review - Discuss what makes a good performance and identify areas for improvement. Listen to a variety of music, discussing likes and dislikes and how musical elements can change the mood of music (happy, sad, scary or lively). Breadth of study - Sing and play pieces from different countries, periods of music, styles, traditional songs and explore musical composers. Personal development - Maintain a simple part within a group and perform with control and awareness of what others in the group are singing or playing. Within these units of work, the Cumbria Music teacher will also follow the online music resource Charanga, which enables children to explore the following areas: Sing in tune with accurate pitch, showing control in their voice. Show awareness of others and maintain a simple part in a group. They also begin to carefully choose the order of different sounds to create a small sequence.
